



CHARLES DICKENS AS AN EXPOSER OF HUMANISM AND SOCIAL INJUSTICE

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ABSTRACT

This thesis explores Charles Dickens as a leading promoter of humanism and critic of social injustice in Victorian England. His novel "Great Expectations" reveals harsh realities of industrial society like poverty, child labor and class inequality. Through compassionate characters, Dickens unveils the cruelty of social institutions while emphasizing moral integrity, empathy and human dignity as foundation for social reform

Introduction: In literature, the concepts of humanism and social injustice play a crucial role in revealing the moral and social consciousness of an age. Humanism emphasizes the value, dignity and moral potential of every individual, promoting compassion, empathy and respect for human life. It reflects the belief that true greatness lies not in power or wealth but in humanity and moral virtue. On the other hand, social injustice refers to the unfair treatment of people within society, including inequality, poverty and exploitation caused by class divisions or corrupt institutions. For example, in the eighteenth century, Jonatan Swift used his powerful satire to criticize political corruption and moral hypocrisy in his "Gulliver's Travel". Similarly, Voltaire in "Candide" showed the cruelty and ignorance of the world, promoting endurance, reason and human goodness.

Among these writers, Charles Dickens stands out one of the most influential figures who has powerful voice against these issues in the XIX century. Charles Dickens is widely known not only as a literary genius but for his deep concern with social and moral issues as well. His novels reflect the harsh realities of Victorian England. Living during a period of rapid industrialization, Dickens witnessed widespread poverty, child labor and depersonalizing effects of class system. These experiences deeply shaped his views and inspired his capability of human beings and to explore injustice through literature.

Ch.Dickens's works reflect the dual nature of Victorian society – immense wealth and privilege on one side and misery and neglect on the other. His works suggest that true nobility is measured not by birth or wealth but by moral integrity and compassion. His humanistic vision continues to resonate in modern times, reminding readers that empathy and moral responsibility are essential for a just society.

In *Great Expectations*, Dickens presents both the cruelty of the social hierarchy and the redemptive power of human compassion. The protagonist Pip begins as a poor orphan who dreams of becoming a gentleman. His ambition, shaped by a class-conscious society, blinds him to the genuine love and kindness of humble people like Joe Gargery. However, Dickens leads Pip through moral awakening and he learns that true nobility lies not in wealth but in integrity and empathy.

The figure of Magwitch, the convict who secretly becomes Pip's benefactor, exposes the hypocrisy of a society that judges people by status rather than morality. Though criminalized by the law, Magwitch shows greater humanity than many "respectable" citizens. Through Pip's transformation and his reconciliation with Joe, Dickens asserts that compassion and forgiveness are the only forces that can heal both individuals and society.

Oliver Twist is one of Dickens's earliest protests against the inhumanity of social institutions. The novel condemns the Poor Law of 1834 and the cruel treatment of orphans in workhouses. Oliver's innocent request for "more" becomes a symbolic demand for human dignity in a heartless world. Characters like Mr. Brownlow and Nancy demonstrate that moral goodness can exist even among the poor and outcast.

In *Bleak House*, Dickens expands his criticism to the legal system through the endless case of Jarndyce and Jarndyce. The fog surrounding the Court of Chancery symbolizes moral blindness and bureaucratic decay. Yet, amid the corruption, characters such as Esther Summerson embody Dickens's humanistic values: humility, charity and moral strength. Her quiet compassion stands in contrast to the selfishness and vanity of the upper class, reinforcing Dickens's belief that moral clarity is the path to justice.

Throughout his works, Dickens consistently unites the themes of humanism and social injustice. His novels expose the suffering caused by greed, inequality and institutional neglect, while also celebrating the redemptive power of kindness and moral courage. For Dickens, social reform begins in the heart; a compassionate individual can challenge the cruelty of an unjust system.

Conclusion: By portraying the struggles of the poor and the moral triumph of simple goodness, Dickens transformed literature into a moral instrument for change. His message
