



THE DEVELOPMENT OF SCIENCE AND CULTURE DURING THE TIMURID ERA

He established libraries, madrasahs (educational institutions), and observatories, encouraging the development of knowledge and craftsmanship. Timur’s vision created a legacy that inspired his successors to continue nurturing intellectual and artistic excellence.

Mirzo Ulugh Beg (1394–1449), Amir Timur’s grandson, is recognized as one of the greatest astronomers and scholars of the medieval Islamic world. In 1428, he established the

world-famous Ulugh Beg Observatory in Samarkand, where outstanding scholars such as Qadi Zada al-Rumi, Giyath al-Din Jamshid al-Kashi, and Ali Qushji worked. Their collective effort resulted in the creation of the *Zij-i Jadid-i Kuragoni* ("New Astronomical Tables of the Kuragon"), one of the most accurate astronomical catalogues of the pre-modern world. Ulugh Beg's observatory became a center for astronomical and mathematical research, and his findings influenced both Eastern and European scientists. In addition, the Ulugh Beg Madrasah, located on the Registan Square, was one of the most advanced educational institutions of its time, where logic, astronomy, mathematics, and philosophy were taught.

Under Sultan Husayn Bayqara (1469–1506), Herat became a beacon of culture and art, often called the "Florence of the East." Alisher Navoi, the most prominent figure of this period, not only reformed Turkic literature but also played a vital role as a statesman and patron of culture. His works, such as *Khamsa*, *Lison ut-Tayr*, and *Mahbub ul-Qulub*, exemplified humanistic ideals and deeply influenced Turkic and Persian literary traditions. The Herat School of Miniature Painting, led by Kamoliddin Behzod, flourished during this era, producing works of exquisite beauty and sophistication. Behzod's paintings, characterized by delicate detail and expressive composition, became models for Persian and Mughal art in subsequent centuries. The literary collaboration between Navoi and his mentor Abdurahman Jami also symbolizes the intellectual unity of the Timurid age.

The scientific and artistic achievements of the Timurid period transcended geographical boundaries. The works of Ulugh Beg in astronomy, the art of Behzod, and the writings of Navoi and Jami had a profound impact on both the Islamic world and Europe. The transmission of their knowledge contributed to the intellectual awakening that paralleled the European Renaissance. Today, the Timurid heritage remains a source of national pride and serves as a reminder of the historical depth of Central Asian civilization. The preservation and study of this heritage not only connect modern Uzbekistan to its glorious past but also inspire future generations to value knowledge, creativity, and cultural identity.
